New landfill site could stabilize garbage costs

An official for the Northwest Municipal Conference said Monday costs for garbage removal in the suburbs may stabilize in the wake of the recent Cook County Board's approval for a landfill in Bartlett.

The landfill, called a "balefill" because garbage would be compacted or baled before being buried in the ground, will hopefully keep rates the same. "It would allow mayors of municipalities to control costs of hauling garbage that would escalate without the project", said Rita Athas assistant director for the conference.

The conference includes 31 municipalities in the northwest suburbs including Niles, Des Plaines, Morton Grove, and Skokie.

Niles trustee Louella Preston and NWMC liaison for the village said the landfills have reached their capacities and a current one in northern Cook County will be filled in several months. "Costs could increase if garbage must be hauled out of the county," she said. "I hope we can move forward with the new balefill which will be beneficial to all towns with waste disposal problems."

The proposed landfill will be located along the county line south of the Northwest Tollway near communities including Bartlett, Elgin and South Elgin. Continued on Page 38

Teletype shopping center gets nod from Niles zoners

Niles took a step closer to enriching its sales tax coffers when zoning commissioners approved rezoning for a proposed shopping center on the AT&T property (Teletype), 5555 Touhy Ave. at a special meeting Monday.

The 68-acre site straddles Skokie and Niles. Proposed for the 28 percent portion of land in Niles are Montgomery Ward and Jewel Foods, as well as eight other retail stores. Anticipated sale tax revenue and annual property taxes is in the neighborhood of \$900,000 each year.

The rezoning from M (manufacturing) to B-2 was sought by the Skokie-based tax-man Corp. in partnership with Trammel Crow Co., Itasca. Approval was subject to recommendations made by the village staff at a meeting last week composed of engineers, police and fire officials regarding the development. Attorney Fred Feinstein, representing the developers, agreed to the conditions prior to the board vote. The recommendations, submitted by Joe Salerno, director of zoning enforcement, were as follows:

Circuit Breaker Program for senior citizens

State Representative Calvin R. Sutker (D-Skokie) recently reminded senior residents to apply for benefits available through the Illinois Circuit Breaker Program. New applications will be accepted beginning January 1, 1988.

"The Circuit Breaker Program is named as such to provide a sort of tax break for those with limited budgets who will not be able to withstand the impact of property taxes or rent payments," Sutker said. "I am proud to have been part of its early life, and I continue to encourage seniors to take advantage of the program each year." The program is administered by the Illinois Department of Revenue. Grants are available to property taxpayers and renters who are 65 years of age or older

and for those blind persons at least 16 years old. Eligibility is based on income level from all sources (including Social Security benefits and other retirement plans) and may not exceed a \$14,000 annual household income.

"The average Circuit Breaker check this year was for \$257. Last year almost 360,000 Illinois residents took advantage of the program, receiving almost \$91 million in benefits," Sutker added. "I think these refunds mean a lot. Especially for those needing the most help to make ends meet."

Medicare enrollment to start in January

People who failed to sign up for Medicare medical insurance, or who once had this protection but dropped it, will have a chance to get this important protection during the 1988 general enrollment period, January through March 31, a Social Security manager said recently.

Medical insurance is that part of Medicare that helps pay for doctor bills, outpatient hospital services, and many other medical items and services not covered by hospital insurance. Protection for people who sign up during the general enrollment period will start July 1, 1988.

Medical insurance is financed by monthly premiums paid by those who have the protection and the Federal Government pays three-fourths of the cost. The basic monthly premium in 1988 is \$24.90.

Generally people who sign up during a general enrollment period may pay a higher premium. This is because the premium is increased by 10 percent for each full year a person could have had this protection but did not.

More information about the medical insurance general enrollment period can be obtained at any Social Security office. Free publications are available there that give more information about medical insurance protection. The address and telephone number of the nearest Social Security office can be found in the telephone directory.

Tax exemptions for senior citizens

Senior Citizens are now eligible for the Homestead Exemption during the year in which they become 65 says Tom Rueckert, Assessor, Maine Township.

The Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption provides a tax relief by reducing the equalized assessed valuation by \$2,000 which can result in a \$200 tax savings.

To be eligible, senior citizens must be 65 or older, during the year for which they are applying. As of Jan. 1 of the year in question, seniors must either own the property or have a lease or contract which makes them responsible for the real estate taxes.

Seniors must provide: Proof of age, Proof of ownership, And a recent tax bill.

Senior Citizens may file for this exemption at the Maine Township Assessor's office, 1700 Ballard Road, Park Ridge.

New tax on used car purchase from individuals

People who buy a used car from a private individual (rather than a car dealer) will be taxed on the purchase differently after Dec. 31.

The current tax is 5 percent of the sale price. The new tax is based on the age and value of the vehicle.

Also, persons who purchase old cars - at least 10 years old - will now have to file a return and pay tax on the purchase. They had been exempt. Persons who buy cars from immediate family members will also have to pay some tax for the first time.

"The tax applies to cars, vans, pick-up trucks and small buses, and it's due within 30 days of purchase. Most people pay the tax when they register the vehicle with the Secretary of State," said Illinois Department of Revenue director Roger Sweet. "Cars registered after Jan. 1, regardless of when they were purchased, will be taxed under the new system. In all cases, it is the car buyer who is responsible for filing a return and paying this tax."

The Vehicle Use Tax Return -RUT-50 - is available at all Secretary of State and Department of Revenue offices. Returns are also available at most banks and currency exchanges and remitter's offices.

Under the new formula, the tax on most vehicles will range from \$25 to \$390.

The tax is different for luxury vehicles. Expensive cars - those that sell for \$15,000 or more - will be taxed on a scale that ranges from \$750 to \$1,500, depending on the purchase price.

To figure the age of a vehicle, subtract the model year of the car from the current calendar year. For instance, a 1986 model car purchased in 1988 is 2 years old (1988 minus 1986). A worksheet is provided with the used car tax return instructions to help the purchaser determine the car's taxable age.

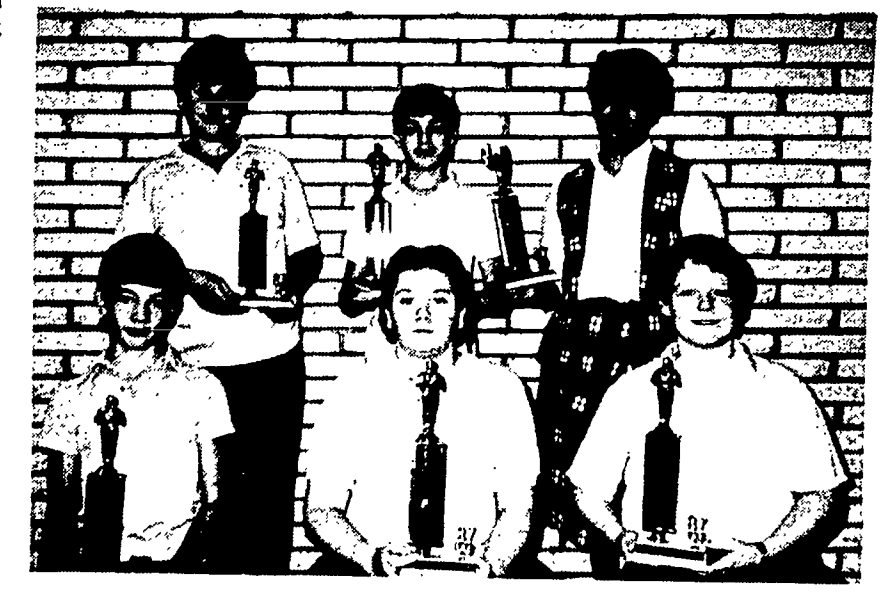

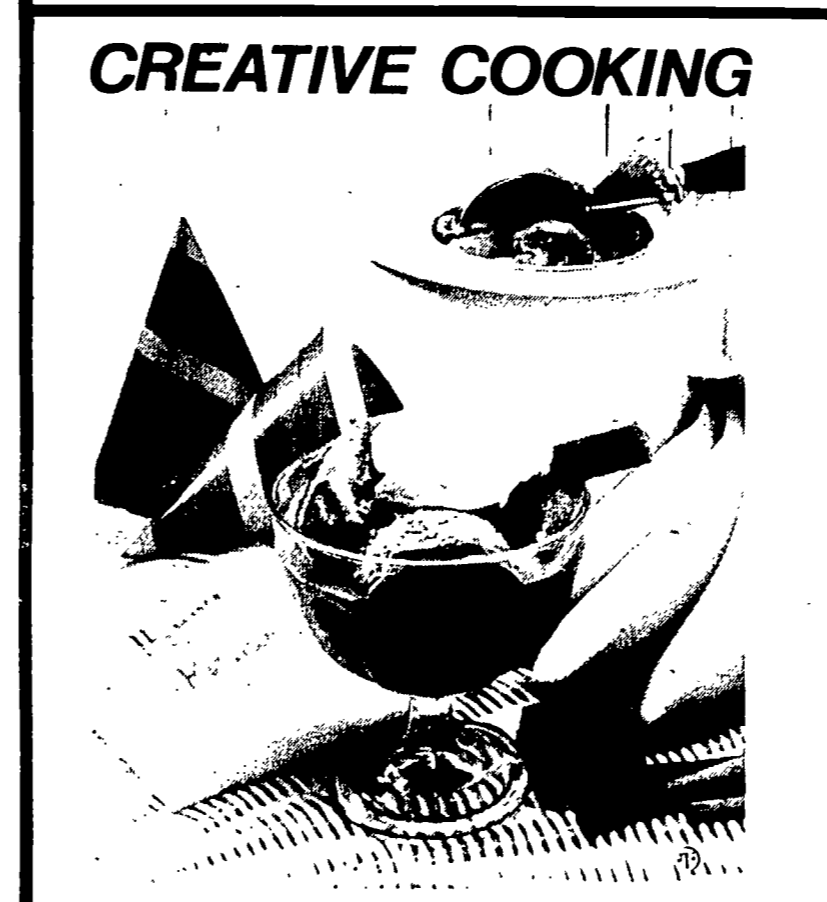

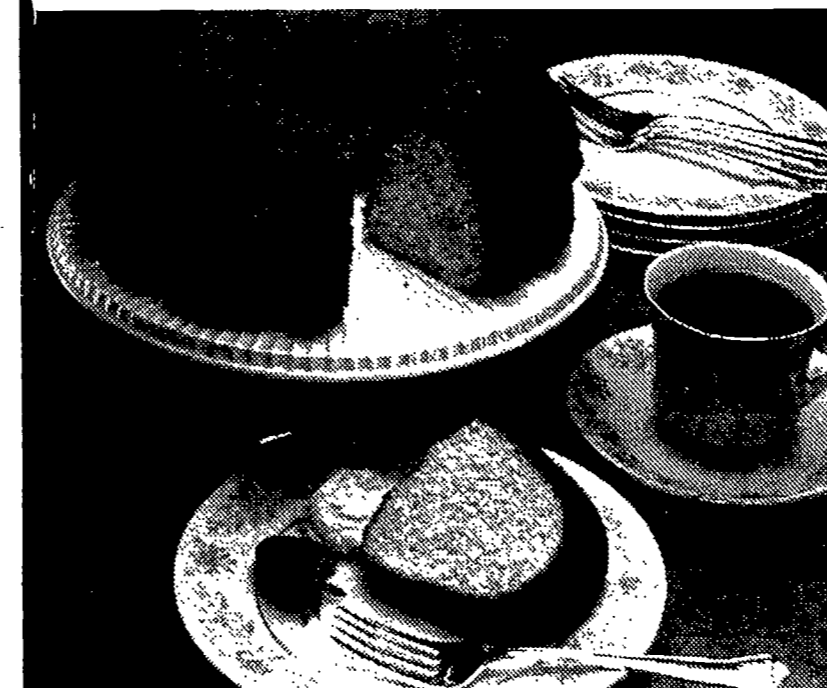

Safety tips on winter driving

by Secretary of State Jim Edgar

Wet roads, freezing rain and snow make driving hazardous by reducing traction and increasing the possibility of skidding. The AAA-Chicago Motor Club recommends that drivers of both front- and rear-wheel-drive cars take the following steps to get out of a skid:

1. If you start to skid, do not hit the brakes and do not panic.
 2. Ease your foot off the gas pedal until the tires regain traction and you can steer the car. Experienced drivers often decelerate or shift into neutral to equalize the drive force on all four wheels. However, this technique must be practiced before you try it in an emergency.
 3. Steer gently in the direction you want the front of the car to go. Oversteering could cause a severe spin.
 4. When the tires have regained traction, shift back into gear. Accelerate slightly on front-wheel drive cars.
- Skids are usually caused by rapid acceleration, sudden braking, oversteering or going to fast for conditions. Remember to accelerate smoothly, increase following distances and signal turns and lane changes well in advance.
- The Motor Club says the best way to avoid skids on slippery roads is to remember the three C's of winter driving: caution, concentration and care.

High school students ranking in the upper quarter of their graduating class, who have a minimum A.C.T. score of 23 or an S.A.T. composite score of 1000, are eligible, as are post-secondary students whose cumulative college grade point average is 3.0 or higher.

In addition, the following also will be required: a 500-1000 word essay describing the candidate's visions of him/herself as a future nurse, using Loyola University's motto, "Knowledge in the Service of People"; a list of the candidate's community service and leadership activities; and two letters of recommendation from teachers, clergy or service people with whom the candidate has worked.

These scholarships are renewable for three years with the maintenance of full-time academic standing and a minimum cumulative G.P.A. of 3.0.

The deadline date for application is Feb. 15, 1988, and the scholarship awards will be announced in mid-March.

'Santa' delivers MRI scanner to Resurrection Hospital

Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), medical science's newest diagnostic tool, arrived with the help of Santa on Monday, Nov. 23 at Resurrection Hospital, 7435 W. Talcott Ave., Chicago.

The 5-1/2 ton MRI magnet was lowered at crane into its newly constructed facility located on the ground floor of the Resurrection Professional Building. Resurrection is among only five or six MRI scanning facilities in the Chicago metropolitan area and is believed to be the first Catholic community hospital to acquire the sophisticated new equipment.

"The addition of an MRI unit highlights our efforts to keep pace with ever changing technology and to respond to the needs of our community," noted Sister Bonaventure, C.R., Resurrection Health Care Corporation president.

Magnetic resonance imaging is a type of body imaging which combines a superconductive magnetic scanner, radio frequency waves and computerized graphics to provide high contrast images of soft body tissues without interference by overlying bones, according to Dr. Stasia Frank of Resurrection's Specialized Imaging department.

With the new MRI scanner, physicians will be able to detect energy differences in body tissues important in diagnosing such problems as multiple sclerosis, tiny tumors, small abnormalities in fluid spaces of the brain and spinal cord, and blood flow abnormalities in the heart and major blood vessels.

MRI also "sees" cervical disc disease, spinal vascular malformations, soft tissue tumor growth

in the abdomen and pelvis, bone disease, cartilage tears and other neurological, spinal, cardiac, musculoskeletal, abdominal and pelvis problems.

The magnet used is large enough to surround the entire body, and the machine housing the magnet looks much like a CAT scanner with a non-magnetic stretcher which slides into the giant opening. The scanning procedure is painless and has no known side effects, according to Dr. Frank.

Research, innovation and discovery have heralded a new era in imaging since Wilhelm Roentgen first discovered the

prototype for the common X-ray procedure in 1895.

MRI offers new perspectives as physicians now have the capability of imaging in three planes without changing patient position.

"The addition of an MRI unit to our present imaging capabilities marks another milestone in our quest for ultimates," Dr. Frank noted.

Resurrection's new MRI scanner is a VISTA high performance model produced by Picker International, Inc. in Ohio. Construction on the MRI facility is expected to continue this winter with a late spring opening date.

Keep holidays happy by driving sober

Last year, 24 people died in car accidents in Illinois over the Christmas weekend, and more than 1,300 were injured, according to the state Department of Transportation.

Two-thirds of those injured in Illinois holiday traffic accidents suffered head injuries.

"The leading cause of this year's accidents will be drunk driving, based on statistics from past holidays," said Janet Walton, program director for New Medico Rehabilitation Services of Chicago in Downers Grove, which provides outpatient rehabilitation services to people suffering brain damage from head injuries.

In 1986, there were 114 people injured for each person killed. One person was injured every 2 minutes and 51 seconds in Illinois as a result of traffic accidents last year, according to Department of Transportation statistics.

"Eat, drink and be merry" is a motto by which millions plan to celebrate the holidays in Illinois," Walton said. "But many people don't know when to stop drinking and that can be tragic, even deadly."

Many holiday accidents can be prevented by simply using a little common sense when celebrating Christmas and the New Year.

"People often forget some of the basic rules for driving safely during the holidays as their attention is focused on shopping, parties and family reunions," Walton said.

Here are a few suggestions on driving safely during the holidays: Travel to and from parties in small groups with at least one designated driver who agrees not to drink. Don't expect too much from the holidays. Depression can lead to heavier drinking to blunt unpleasant feelings. Set limits for yourself, if you do drink. Try diluting your drinks with mixers. It will pay off on the drive home. Don't forget about eating. Food helps slow

down the absorption of alcohol into the blood stream, lessening the impairing effects of the alcohol.

In 1986, drivers under the age of 24 accounted for 57 percent of the traffic accidents in Illinois.

"It's sad, but the majority of traffic accidents involve young drivers who are then faced with a lifetime of paying for their mistake," Walton said.

Speaking of the Library...

Someone asked the other day if perhaps the library's priorities were in the wrong order. They thought we place too much emphasis on computers and not enough on books. After I explained the whole truth of the situation, they felt better and agreed that, indeed, the library is emphasizing books, as it should. In case others are thinking the same thoughts, I'd like to take this opportunity to review my priorities for the library.

Everyone has heard a lot about computers at the library in the past two years. At times, even I get sick of hearing the work. What's happened is that when the Board of Trustees planned for the online catalog system as well as the Computer Lab. When construction was completed and the new building opened for public use, voila!, the public saw computers everywhere they turned. Their first encounter was with the computer terminal at the circulation desk, their next encounter was with the computer terminal which replaced the card catalog, and then they saw the glass enclosed Computer Lab with microcomputers for public use.

The influx of computers and terminals that seemed to occur almost overnight needs to be put in proper perspective. First, the library paid for the automated circulation and catalog system along with the construction. It was a one time only purchase. The new system has been responsible for decreasing the amount of time it takes to get materials from other libraries, for keeping track of the reserves list, and for prompting us to purchase books which are in high demand. The system has also resulted in a staffing decrease in the Technical Services and Circulation departments. With the computer, we are able to handle much more traffic, both book and people, with less staff. It is, therefore, saving us money.

Sometimes people ask me if we couldn't spend money on books instead of the computers in the Computer Lab. I explain that we haven't really spent that much on those computers. Three of the Apple computers were purchased five years ago for about \$900, and the AT&T was recently purchased at great discount. The two T1s cost \$50 each. Most of the other computers were purchased with grant or gift funds. For example, an Apple IIe and the Macintosh were purchased with grant money. The Apple IIGS was a gift from the Friends of the Library.

I agree that our priority should be books rather than computers. In fact, books are the priority. Prior to my being Administrator, the library was budgeting seven to eight percent of its total budget for materials (books, newspapers, magazines). Two years ago, I cut expenditures in many areas in order to dedicate fifteen percent of the library's budget for materials. This was double what had been budgeted in the past. This year we are again allocating fifteen percent of our budget for materials.

Indeed, books are the priority at this library. Compare this: we budget fifteen percent of our budget for materials and only .002 percent of our budget for computers. That comparison should, I hope, put some fears to rest.

So, next time you visit the library, please remember that our computers offer us increased access to the library's materials and allow us to keep costs down. Also, have a good look at the library's shelves—you'll be impressed at the number of recent additions to the book collection. Books are a priority!

NI-Gas urges customers to prepare for winter

Northern Illinois Gas urges customers to plan for the winter by maintaining the efficiency of their heating system in their homes. Proper upkeep will maximize the equipment's performance and save on operating costs.

There are important steps to take in order to prepare for winter. To maintain the efficiency of one's heating system, it is necessary to check equipment periodically and follow a preventative maintenance schedule.

Contact a qualified contractor to ensure proper flame adjustment, fan and motor operation, and safe, efficient functioning of controls and venting systems. An annual inspection will help provide trouble-free performance during the coming winter.

In a warm-air heating system, the furnace sends heated air to rooms through sheet metal ductwork. Pay special attention on "Fan and motor bearings. They should be oiled as recommended by manufacturer."

"The furnace filter. Hold it up to a light. If unable to see through the filter, clean or replace it."

"Duct work. Wrap insulation ducts through unheated areas. Check for air leaks. Leaks can be eliminated by wrapping with duct tape."

"The humidifier. Check and clean it annually. Properly humidified air is more comfortable in winter, allowing a lower thermostat setting without sacrificing comfort."

Hot water heating systems feature hot water or steam circulating in radiators or coils to warm the home. Follow these tips:

- During annual checkup, bleed radiator and check water or flow control, pressure relief valve and pump operation and look for indication of water leakage.
- Insulate hot water or steam pipes in unheated areas.
- Use a brush periodically to keep radiators clean and operating efficiently. Decorative covers should allow unrestricted air circulation.
- Turn off radiators or metal coils in seldom-used areas of the home.
- Proper operation of gas appliance venting systems should be verified periodically. The "match test" is highly recommended. (If your furnace or boiler has an induced draft system, and many of the newer models are so equipped, you may not be able to perform the "match test". Consult your equipment manual.)
- Run the furnace or boiler at least five minutes until combustion products heat the vent pipe. Then move a lighted match across the draft hood's entire width, holding it at the edge. Observe the flame. If it is drawn upward, vent pipes and/or chimney are clear. If flame is blown downward or extinguished, have the chimney and vent system checked by NI-Gas or a qualified service contractor.
- Many chimneys may be checked for blockage visually by inserting a small mirror into the clean-out opening at the chimney base. If the vent is blocked, remove the obstruction immediately or ask a qualified contractor to handle the task.
- Good circulation and adequate oxygen supply are also vital for efficient appliance operation. Signs of improper operation include a yellow or wavering burner flame, discoloration around access doors, a pungent odor or soot deposits near burner or vent area. If any of these conditions occur, have the equipment inspected by a NI-Gas representative who will advise you if repairs by a qualified contractor are necessary. Under extremely adverse conditions, carbon monoxide can be produced by failure to vent products of combustion properly, having insufficient fresh air to support proper burning of fuel or by improperly adjusted appliances. If symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are experienced—headache, yawning, ringing in the ears, weariness, vomiting, heart fluttering or throbbing—get fresh air promptly. Open windows and go outdoors. Shut off any suspected improperly operating gas appliances and have it checked by NI-Gas or another qualified contractor immediately.
- The few minutes it takes to check your furnace or boiler will prove to be time well spent to ensure the safe, efficient operation of your heating system.

Athas said the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency must issue an operating license before the landfill can open. The conference will need to conduct detailed engineering plans to obtain the document. "Part of the engineering work has been done," she said.

A block to the plans could be a legal challenge concerning the landfill or behalf by Bartlett, but NWMCO officials have not received legal notification of a lawsuit thus far, Athas said.

Bartlett officials have expressed concern the conference's guarantees on property values and water supply could be flawed once the landfill is in operation. They contend that no landfill is completely safe and environmental concerns remain.

cluded location of fire hydrants as required by the Niles Fire Department and a westerly windway (on Touhy) be increased from 28 feet to 30 feet with signs posted for "service and emergency vehicles only."

Developers also agreed to parking requirements of five parking spaces for every 1,000 square feet for the total property. "Skokie officials were also amenable to the 5-1 ratio," Feinstein said. About 4,100 cars can be accommodated in ground lots and a 340-car parking garage.

Developers hope to renovate existing buildings on the total project and construct new buildings to house retailers, including a Dominick's supermarket on the Skokie side.

According to Feinstein, the Niles portion is a parking lot, and development would begin there in the first phase of construction. Montgomery Ward, facing north of Touhy, would occupy 100,000 to 150,000 square feet and the Jewel Store about 55,000 to 75,000 square feet. Other plans call for construction of retail shops in the remaining space.

Salerno suggested relocation of some stores to improve parking facilities, saying Jewel could replace the Montgomery Ward location because of "in and out shopping" at the food store. Feinstein said the matter would

be considered by the board.

In a repetition of the Dec. 7 meeting, an attorney representing Edgebrook Community Assn. said the proposed size of the center and its impact was of concern to residents living adjacent to the site (Skokie portion).

Attorney Peter Coblentz said residents were objecting to a dense project backed against their residential area which would result in heavy traffic "mostly from the Skokie side and part from Niles." Noise and air pollution were other concerns.

In discussing the site plan, he suggested some of the buildings be relocated or eliminated to improve the project.

Coblentz noted the project, as proposed, would provide poor visibility for shoppers driving to the site. "A prime example is the location proposed for Montgomery Ward. In addition, people will come into the center and find no easy access to other stores," he said. "The big question is, will a shopping center this size work and will it be a success economically?"

Commissioner Angelo Troiani asked the attorney if he thought land planner Ralph Campbell had not done a "good job" in preparing the site plan for the project. Coblentz replied, "I respect Campbell, but he did about as good as can be done with a difficult piece of property."

Grennan Heights burglars get continuance

Two Chicago men who allegedly participated in a series of burglaries in a Niles residential area, were granted a continuance to Jan. 13 by the Des Plaines Circuit Court last week, according to Sgt. John Fryksdale of the Niles Police Department.

It was a second continuance for suspects Joseph Moscatello and Joseph Varney, Jr. after they were arrested Nov. 2 in the Grennan Heights area. They were also suspected of at least eight other home burglaries that occurred in the same area between Oct. 27 and Nov. 2.

Joi Ann Moscatello also charged in connection with the Nov. 2 case, failed to appear in Niles Third District Court on Nov. 13 and forfeited \$2,000 bond. An outstanding warrant for her arrest was issued by police, Fryksdale said.

The suspects were arrested in Niles after an Ozark St. resident reported a suspicious auto in front of his neighbor's house. Police learned a man left the car and was walking to the rear of the house in the 8200 block of Ozark, and a man and woman were leaving the scene in the vehicle proceeding toward Milwaukee Ave.

Police stopped the car at Ozark and Milwaukee and subsequently found a watch in Joseph Moscatello's pocket. A check showed it matched the description of a watch stolen in a recent robbery, according to police.

During questioning, Moscatello admitted to the burglary and was charged with one count of residential burglary. His wife was charged with possession of stolen property. Varney admitted committing four burglaries and was initially charged with the same. "However, he added charge of attempted burglary was brought against Varney several weeks ago after the intended victim identified a police photo of the suspect," Fryksdale said.

In discussing Varney's arrest on Nov. 2, Fryksdale said police saw the alleged offender run from the rear of a home in the 8200 block of Ozark and he was arrested after a block-long chase. A subsequent check showed various household goods on the back porch that apparently had been removed from the residence.

asbestos and hazardous waste resulting from demolition of some of the buildings on the AT&T property. "Skokie officials have recommended documentation go to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to determine compliance with its standards," Coblentz said.

Feinstein said there would be full compliance with EPA requirements in disposal of hazardous waste (from Teletype operations) and asbestos existing in some of the buildings. "We are aware of residents' concerns. We have met with neighbors in the Edgebrook community to tell them of our plans in screening the center with a 10-foot brick fence from the residential area to alleviate car noise and other activities on the property," he said.

Rezoning of the property and the site plan were approved by the Skokie Plan Commission, but also must come from Niles before the development can go ahead. The village boards from both communities give final approval, according to a Niles trustee.

At the Dec. 7 zoning board meeting, it was proposed Skokie and Niles enter an intergovernmental agreement to provide police and fire protection and utility services for the center.

principle," Gump said. "Like Jean, it's also a matter of conscience. Nuclear weapons have no right to exist... they are death-dealing devices of indiscriminate destruction."

He noted other peace groups affiliated with Transfiguration Plowshares are active on the East Coast, Michigan and Wisconsin. "We are trying to follow God's law which is over and beyond nuclear weapons."

Asked about the recent Reagan-Gorbachev strategic nuclear arms reduction agreement, Gump replied, "Anything that would begin reduction of nuclear arms is a step in the right direction."

Gump said he was surprised at the leniency of his sentence because a federal court in Missouri could impose a maximum of 18 years to minimum of 30 months in jail. "The judge commented he did not want to make martyrs of us, but imposing the \$13,000 restitution would act as a deterrent to others."

Gump will not begin his jail term until Jan. 19 and will report to a federal officer on that date to be transported to an unknown minimum security prison. Meanwhile, he plans to visit his wife over the holidays.

"We will be allowed to rent a cottage near Alderson prison in West Virginia where she is serving her term I'm anticipating a very happy reunion," he said.

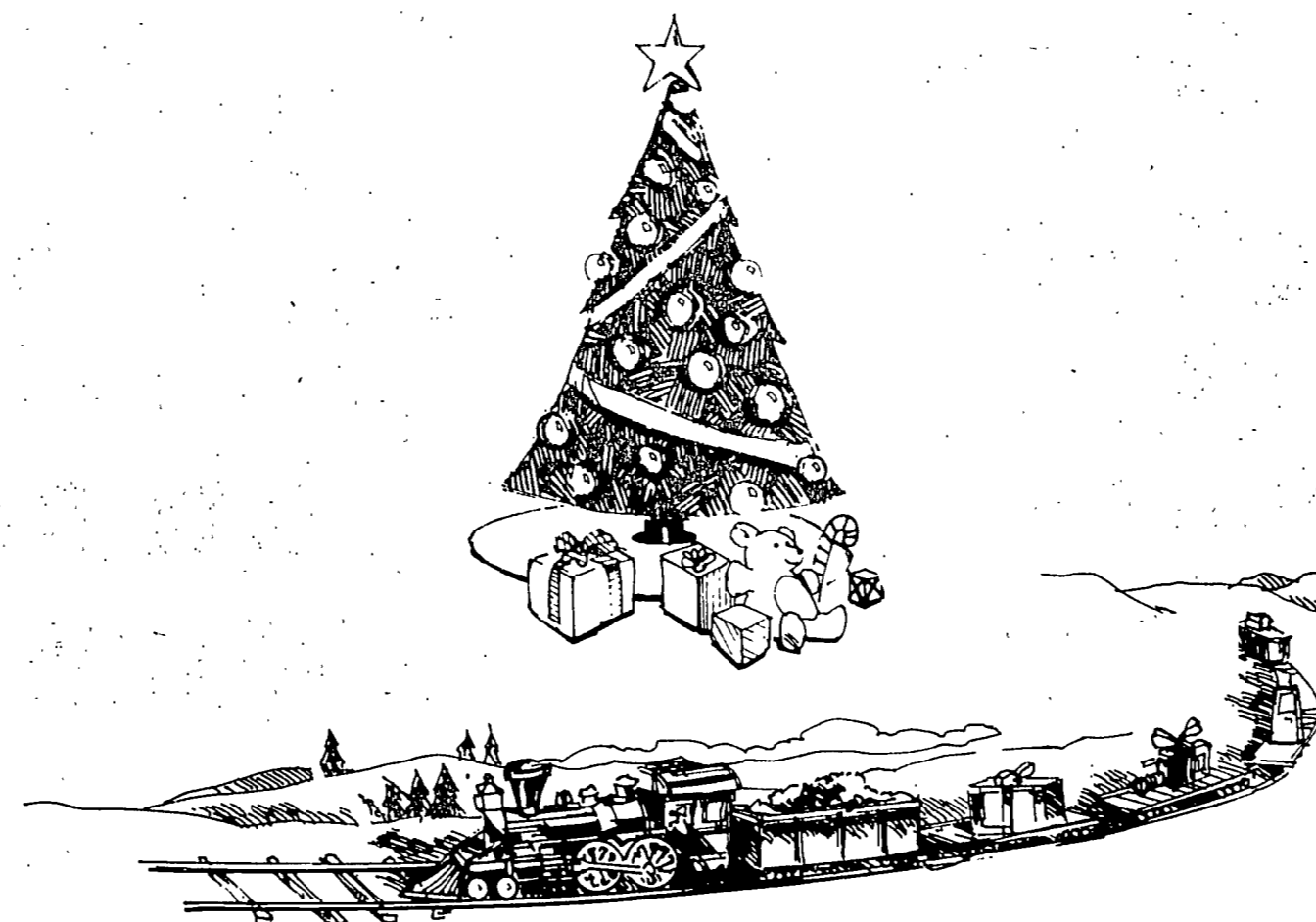
